

# Alumnus drag queen to rule "RuPaul's Drag Race"

Traveling back in time to opening night of Perry Meridian's 2013 production of "Peter Pan," **Andrew Bryson** appears in green tights with a feather in his cap, mic tape stuck to his foundation-blended face as he dances on stage as the star of his senior year musical.

Who would have guessed that five years later, Bryson's love for the stage and performance would bring him all the way to Rupaul's Drag Race in the form of his drag persona: Blair St. Clair?

**Stefanie Davis**, theatre teacher, describes Bryson as a brilliant performer on stage.

"I remember that his sophomore year included an early attempt at public drag as he dressed up as Britney Spears for homecoming. What was of note was that he was really good. Heads turned all over the building," says Davis.

The 22-year-old said he acted in theater every year of high school, and even directed for the first year of FEST, Falcon Expressions in Student Theatre, during his senior year.

Melissa Walsh, music department chair and choir teacher, remembers her former student fondly.

"Drew was a very enthusiastic and a dedicated performer when he was a

student here," she says. "He was and still is a hard worker."

Even with his presence gone from the halls, his influence still lives on through the current musicals the school puts on.

His styled wigs have been used in many of Perry's productions, including the witch wig in "Big Fish" from 2016.

The cast list for Rupaul's Drag Race Season 10, hosted by famous drag personality RuPaul Charles, was announced on Feb. 22. "Blair St. Clair" was spelled out in shining neon lights for all viewers to see.

The reality show, celebrating its 10-year anniversary, is a drag competition with 14 hand-picked drag queens competing in weekly challenges to prove to Rupaul and guest judges that they deserve the \$100,000 cash prize and title of America's Next Drag Superstar.

Each week, the panel of judges picks which two queens performed the weakest in the main challenge. Repeated main challenges have been expressing individuality while also reading scripts as a character in an acting challenge, often a spoof on current day situations. The two bottom contestants will then go head to head in a lip-sync battle in which the winner will stay and the loser will 'sashay away'.

St. Clair will be making history

as the first drag queen from Indiana to compete on the show, and describes herself as 'a small town girl with big dreams.'

Bryson is excited to finally be able to talk about his experience and competing on the show, which was filmed six months prior to the airing date, March 22 at 8 p.m.

"I'm incredibly excited. While we were filming, we didn't have contact with anyone outside of the show for six weeks," says Bryson, who can't reveal any details about his performance on the show until after it airs.

St. Clair presents herself as a confident queen with all the tricks up her sleeves, never being a one-trick pony.

"I do a whole lot more than just put makeup on. I sing, I dance, I act, I sew. I do it all."

St. Clair's old-Hollywood aesthetic of drag has taken her to the television screen, and as the first contestant from Indiana, the locals are prepared to cheer her on. A Feb. 26 party commemorated the Hoosier's accomplishment at the Metro NightClub on Mass Ave., where rainbow flags were waving.

"Blair St. Clair is a young, effervescent girl who loves vintage fashion," says St. Clair — referring to "herself" in third person. "She's a free spirit and a fresh twist but classic and refined."
