

Noah Warren wins state, Schoettl's first champion

After achieving state runner-up in the 152-pound-weight class last year, **Noah Warren** stormed back this year as a senior to win the state title in the 170-pound-weight class at Bankers Life Fieldhouse Saturday.

He defeated Jordan Rader from Peru High School, during a hardfought match where near the end Noah get medical attention from the staff available, after the attention gave to Noah he returned to the mat and defeat his rival. "I feel like I finally accomplished something," Noah said.

Noah was **Matthew Schoettl's** first champion wrestler as Perry's new head coach this year. He was an assistant Perry coach for several previous years.

"It was very gratifying see him accomplish his goal," Schoettl said, adding that he's known Warren since he was five years old. "He was built for this."

The 19-year-old credits Schoettl for helping him win. He said the coach knows everyone's potential and how hard to make them work. "He's really tough on guys."

Including Noah's "little" brother Aiden, a Perry freshman, who wrestles in the 152-pound weight class. "He knows how to push us really hard," Aiden agreed. "But he knows how to joke around with the team outside."

Watching his brother win a state title was "one of the best feelings," Aiden said, adding that the two have been practice partners. He ended his freshman season during the state preliminary match on Friday to Donnell Washington, Jr. of Portage.

But now the 16-year-old feels the pressure to follow his brother's lead and become a champion next year. Noah is confident that Aiden will be a champion, too, especially with three years left in high school. With Schoettl as coach, Noah predicts that his brother will be a repeat winner.

Overall at the state finals, close matches and controversial calls by the officials kept fans and coaches on to the edge of their seats as coaches screamed instructions up until the last seconds of the final wrestling match.

The fieldhouse stands were packed with fans from around the state Friday

and Saturday.

Some of Perry's fiercest rivals at the tournament were from Penn, Floyd Central, Portage, Chesterton, Columbus North and toughest opponent Brownsburg High Schools.

Senior **Daniel Below**, with a record of 37-7 in the 182-pound weight class, lost in the Friday preliminaries to Brownsburg senior Nathan Walton whose record was 41-1.

After Friday's matches, three Falcons, in addition to Noah, continued to Saturday's quarterfinals. Junior **Brooks Davis** (160 pounds) was then defeated by Center Grove senior Gleason Mappes.

Junior **Samuel Fair** finished as a state runner up after facing and defeating Brownsburg and Avon 120-pound weight class rivals. In the final match, Fair lost to Jintown Junior Hunter Watts.

Freshman **Alexander Cottey** (106 pounds) ended up as the highest freshman finisher in the history of PMHS as the state runner up, losing to junior Jacob Moran from Portage. Cottey's mind in to the next season "I hope to win state individually and as a team."

The PMHS tennis team has started their pre-season conditioning, will have their first practice on March 12. Their first match is April 2. The season will end May 12. The team will consist of around 20 girls, with seven playing varsity.

Osborne's laid back style and silent determination is noted among her team and coaches as her defining factor, setting her apart from past players and making her a leader.

"Anna is perhaps the most unselfish player I've coached. In fact, there are times I wish she would be a little more selfish about her competitiveness. She is very team-oriented and is a great asset to the team-building dynamic," head coach **Daniel Schoch** said.

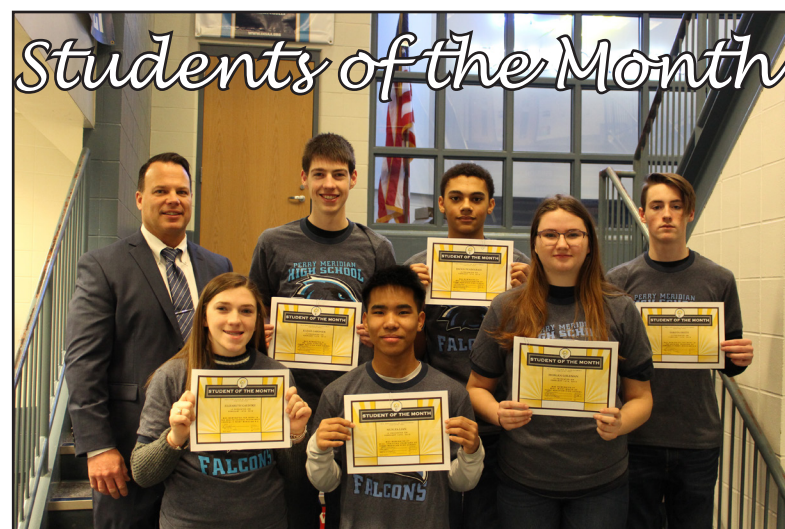
Besides her love for the mechanics of the sport, Osborne prizes the team bonding.
