## Senior swimmers celebrate season as big crowds pack natatorium during Township rivalry wintry home meet

The swimming and diving senior night began with an impromptu baritone rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner" as Cardinal sophomore Justin Tidd sprang into song after audio equipment malfunctioned at the Perry-Southport meet.

The competition continued without another hitch, sound or otherwise.

The Lady Falcons beat Southport, 103-77, while the Falcons fell to the Cardinals, 103-77 on Jan. 11. After the diving portion, seniors Antania Sims, Molly Brodzeller, Natalie Monroe, Joe Gavazzoni, Raul Moreno, Sarah Jones, Taylor Jarboe, Devin Little and foreign exchange student Giuliano Stefanelli walked the length of the pool with white carnation in hand and parents on either side.

On the opposite end of the pool, fellow swimmers and divers' outstretched arms made a tunnel just wide enough for seniors and parents to saunter through single file. Monroe said, "The human tunnel has always been a tradition for senior night. Even though the

Once free, the family units stood in a row for pictures and to wait as the next name was read, basking in the loud noises of approval coming from the second-story bleachers.

ter relay and the 200-meter individual medley. In the IM, and other medley races, swimmers display four different kinds of strokes: butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke and freestyle. Junior Skeens was in the 200-meter freestyle relay. The students in the stands crescendoed after each event.

"It was really great to have a crowd of students there to support us. We don't usually get too many students at our meets," Brodzeller said.

Monroe said she'd never seen so many Falcon fans at a swimming and diving meet before.
